To form a chapter the following criteria must be met:

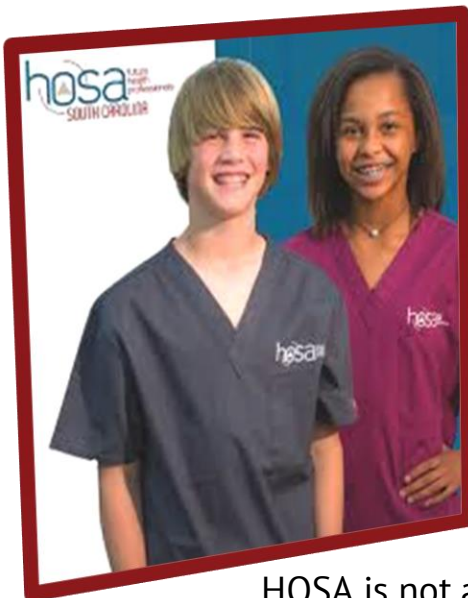
- > Agree to follow state and national bylaws.
- > Register at least 5 members and 1 school advisor.
- > Pay \$5.00 state dues and \$10.00 National HOSA Subscription Fee per member, total of **\$15.00.**
- > Elect Officers
- > Plan activities at school, local and community level.

➤ **WHAT DO WE DO NOW?**

1. Email the HOSA State Advisor, Angel Clark at aclark@ed.sc.gov and tell her that you would like to start a HOSA Chapter at your school.
2. You will then receive a Charter number and a password that you can go on to the national website (www.hosa.org) and register your students and advisors.
3. You need 5 students and 1 advisor to start your chapter.
4. You can print an invoice and request a P.O. for a check to be sent to the National HOSA address on the invoice. If your school needs a W-9, I have one I can forward to you.
5. Once your chapter is established, most chapters order school themed HOSA shirts that they wear on certain days of the week or at least on the date of their monthly meeting..
6. Plan a meeting about once a month. Cover a healthcare topic at each at each meeting by planning for a community event or having a guest speaker. Most meetings last about 30-45 minutes.

7. Plan to participate in the National Service Project- Be The Match or the State Service Project- NAMI-SC.
